



## **Fatal Shooting** Is Adjudged Self-Defense

Elderly Alaskan Who Caused Death Of Construction Worker Is Discharged From Custody After Hearing Before United States Commissioner

The issue of whether a man 74 years old has the right to shoot down a powerfully-built young man, violently drunk, who was attacking him, was decided in three-quarters of an hour this morning when flarry Ray, an Alaskan for 42 years, went free for the killing in the Chena Bar and Grill in this city yesterday morning of big William Howe, 25-year-old deconstruction project track-driver.

## Fairbanks Has \$300,000 Fire

Fairbanks (A)—Flames whipped thr ugh a block of wooden buildings on First avenue Thursday as firemen fought to halt the blaze at the walls of the Pioneer hotel.

owners of establishments razed, including the Northern Hotel, estimated damage at \$300,000.

There were no coports of deaths or injuries. Smoke was discovered at 10 am pouring from the basement of the Chena Bar.

The fire was extinguished after 7 hours fight, but with loss of three 2-story buildings.

Lost were the 41-room Northern hotel and coffee shop owned by Margaret Berge; Pioneer Grill, owned by Don Cook; Star liquor store, Allied Room and liquor store owned by Don Hammond. Nearly 100 were made homeless.


### A NEW LOCATION
